Exhibition Program at Flinders Medical Centre Expression of Interest for 2026

Background

The Southern Adelaide Local Health Network (SALHN) is one of several SA Health portfolios across South Australia and includes Flinders Medical Centre, Noarlunga Hospital, GP Plus Health Care Centres and Super Clinics, Mental health services and Sub-acute services, including Repat Health Precinct site.

Flinders Medical Centre (FMC) is the southern area's largest hospital and provides medical services for people living in the southern metropolitan area of Adelaide. FMC is a major public tertiary hospital with over 900 beds, co-located with Flinders University and the 130 bed Flinders Private Hospital located at Bedford Park, South Australia. It opened in 1976. It serves as the trauma centre for the southern suburbs, and parts of the Adelaide Hills.

Place

Flinders Medical Centre is built on an ancient place – a unique geographical, ecological and cultural place, which was once entirely underwater, submerged beneath a vast ancient ocean. As Earth's surface shifted and collided, a massive landmass formed called Gondwana. The super-continent Gondwana eventually broke apart to form the continents now separated by vast oceans.

Around 500 million years ago, when Australia was still a part of Gondwana, and an ancient mountain range was formed. Over time, these ancient mountains eroded, and are now exposed as Ikara/ Flinders Ranges, Yurebilla/Mount Lofty Ranges, and Karta/ Kangaroo Island.

Australia broke away from Antarctica approximately 56 million years ago during the breakup of Gondwana, forming South Australia's unique and ancient coastline. A few million years ago, during the last ice age, massive icesheets covered the land and shaped the landscape to form the remarkable features of the greater Adelaide hills and plains, rivers, creeks and waterways, still present today. The nearby foothills form part of what is commonly today known as the Adelaide Hills and Mount Lofty Ranges.

Kaurna Culture

This place is nested in enduring wisdom and culture, as the home to thousands of generations of Kaurna people thriving sustainably and nurturing the land and waters for many tens of thousands of years - as one the world's longest living cultures.

SALHN recognises the significant cultural meaning of the place for Kaurna people.

SALHN Arts in Health exists to bring arts and culture to everyday healthcare.

This is achieved through the planning and delivery of clinical services, programs, projects, education and research that promote patient healing and quality experiences of healthcare, enhance staff wellbeing and contribute to cultivating healing hospital and healthcare environments.

- artists based in South Australia
- availability of the works during the dates indicated.

- Details of existing/ proposed works (medium/s, materials, size for existing works)
- Support material (images, link to video, website)
- Artist CV

While the Arts in Health team will endeavour to meet your date preference it may not always be possible. The Arts in Health team will work with the selected artist to finalise the artist statement to ensure it is suitable for patients, visitors and staff.
